Riding two abreast



Cyclists must be within 1.5 metres of each other when riding two abreast. A third rider can overtake these two riders, but cannot continue to ride beside them.



If riding uphill in a group be considerate of other road users and ride in single file.



Who can ride on footpaths in NSW?



Children under the age of 16.



An adult (18 or over) supervising a child under 16. A person who has a medical certificate.



Children under 10 on their parents bike.

Why road riders don't pay registration fees?



Registration and CTP fees are for vehicles requiring inspections. Riders help pay for roads through council fees and taxes.

In the event of an accident, all Bicycle NSW members have public liability insurance. We encourage all riders to become members.



Bike lane Riders must use a bike lane if available, unless impracticable to do so.
