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Re: Sydney Park Road cycleway

Dear Mr Pete McLean,

Thank you for your correspondence to the Secretary of Transport for NSW about Sydney Park Road cycleway. The Secretary has asked me to respond on his behalf.

The Sydney Park Junction project (the Project) is committed to providing improved active transport outcomes for the community of St Peters and in particular, cycling connectivity to Sydney Park and St Peters Station.

The Project will provide the following improvements to the cycling network:

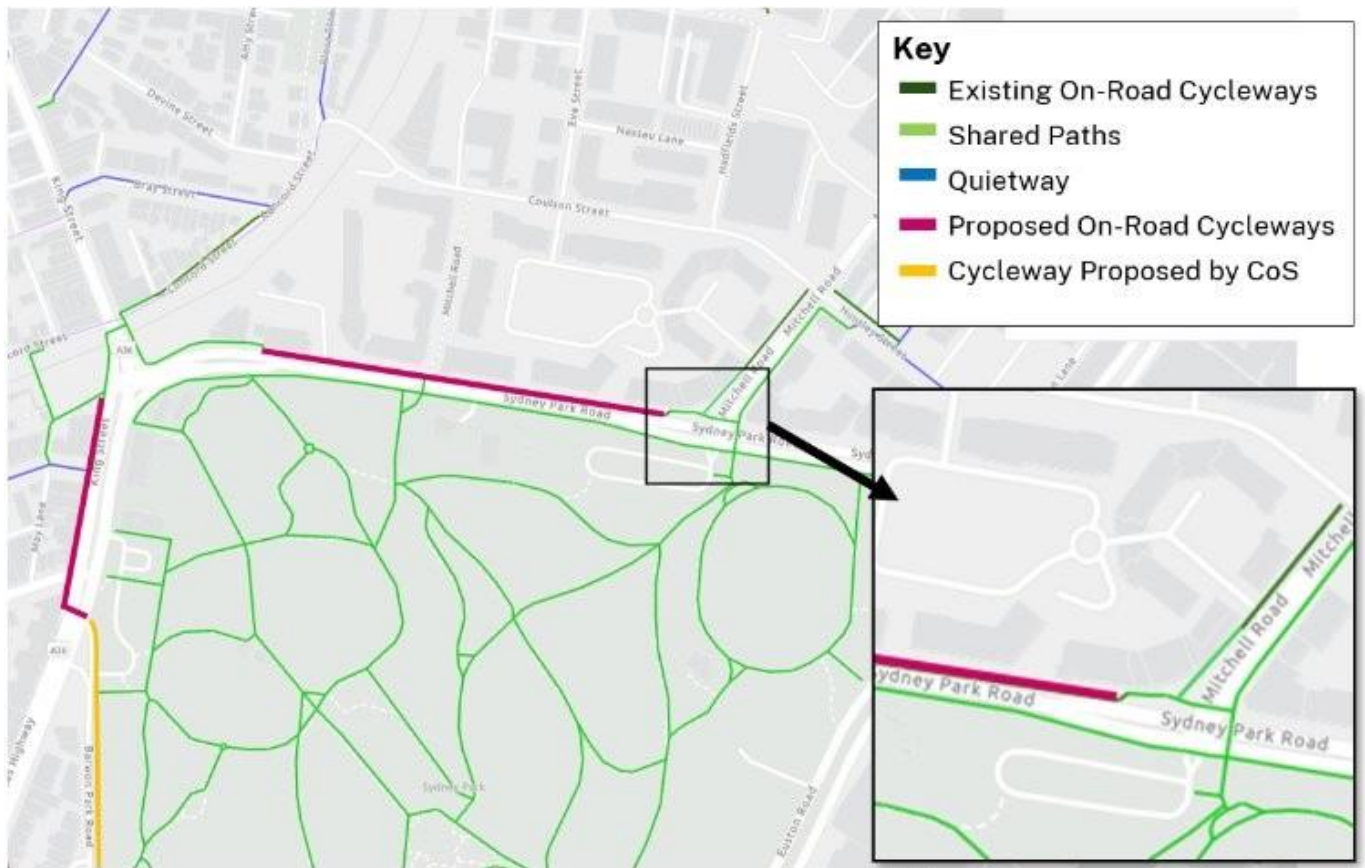
- Converting the pop-up cycleway on Sydney Park Road to a permanent, separated, two-way cycleway with a concrete median to separate bike riders from vehicles and people walking.
- New separated two-way on-road cycleway on the western side of King Street/Princes Highway between the intersection of Sydney Park Road and Barwon Park Road.
- Widened shared pedestrian and cyclist crossings at the intersection of King Street and Sydney Park Road (consistent with the project Review of Environmental Factors)

The Project will support placemaking and vibrancy by providing improved walking and cycling connectivity between the Princes Highway, St Peters Station and the open, green space of Sydney Park. It does this by providing wider footways and providing missing links in the existing cycling network.

The pop-up cycleway on Sydney Park Road that Transport installed as an emergency response to COVID 19, has been in place since July 2020 with a Klemfix barrier separating the cyclists from the eastbound traffic lane. The pop-up connects to existing shared paths on either side which provide connectivity to St Peters Station and Sydney Park. Transport will be prioritising installation of a permanent median with wider kerb ramp connections to the shared paths along the full extent of the existing pop-up cycleway along Sydney Park Road. This work is expected to start in Q4 2024.

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Transport acknowledges that the existing shared path connection between the Mitchell Road cycleway and the Sydney Park Road cycleway is narrow and is investigating options to provide improved connectivity between the two on-road cycleways.

We will continue to keep the community and stakeholders informed as the Project progresses at <https://www.transport.nsw.gov.au/projects/current-projects/sydney-park-junction> as well as through targeted communications.
